Limited Edition – WDWXXV –



In 2015 Witte de With Center for Contemporary Art celebrated its quarter century milestone. Throughout the year, we dedicated our ground-floor gallery to a series of commissioned presentations. Both established and emerging artists were invited to create work, responding in various ways to developments in contemporary art, its landscape and possibilities today, departing from Witte de With's 25 year exhibition history. Titled In Light Of 25 Years, the series made use of a compelling, large-scale light box which integrated the artists' contributions as image-based works created in dialogue with Witte de With's archive.

The limited edition WDWXXV brings together the In Light Of 25 Years commissions. Presented in a slim Plexiglas box frame, inspired by the light box itself and accompanied by a signed certificate, this portfolio features ten high quality prints (20 × 80 cm) which have been produced by the participating artists:

Özlem Altın (1977, Germany), Wineke Gartz (1968, the Netherlands), Camille Henrot (1978, France), Germaine Kruip (1970, the Netherlands), artist collective Mahony (Stephan Kobatsch (Austria), Jenny Wolka (Germany) and Clemens Leuschner (Germany), founded in 2002), Raimundas Malašauskas (1972, Lithuania), Zin Taylor (1978, Canada), Freek Wambacq (1978, Belgium), and Xu Zhen (1977, China).

Mahony's work Safe Harbour was prompted by an interview between the French-Moroccan artist Yto Barrada and the philosopher Nadia Tazi published in A Life Full Of Holes. The Strait Project, the publication accompanying Barrada's eponymous solo exhibition at Witte de With in 2004.

Freek Wambacq draws connections between Eadweard Muybridge, Marcel Broodthaers, cinematic sound effects, and the Polynesian hula dance. Wambacq's point of departure was a work by Marcel Broodthaers, shown at Witte de With as part of *Still: A Novel* (1996).



Wineke Gartz, 000 VA Auroral Blue

Wineke Gartz created a collage combining documents from Witte de With's archive and images of her own work. Prominently featured are archival letters and drawings by artist Paul Thek, to whom Witte de With dedicated the solo exhibition *Paul Thek: The Wonderful World That Almost Was* (1995). Gartz strongly relates to Thek's practice, which she sees as a form of exorcism, dealing with the labyrinths of spirituality, sexuality and technological progress.





AS LONG AS IT LASTS

In 1993, artist Lawrence Weiner made a work on the 185 meter high Euromast in Rotterdam as part of a group exhibition on painting and architecture. He painted the phrase AS LONG AS IT LASTS – which also became the title of the exhibition – up the length of the tower, making it one of the largest works Weiner has realized to date. Özlem Altin, No story, no

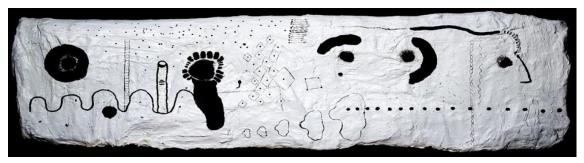

Xu Zhen focussed on the visual identity of Witte de With's past exhibitions as well as its archive of posters. As such, this work brings to light not the artworks shown at Witte de With during the past twenty-five years, but rather the wording and design, which mediated them.





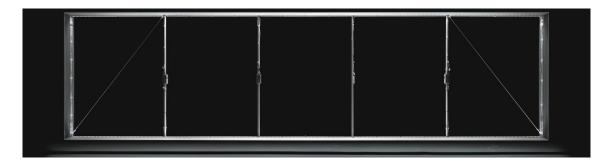
Zin Taylor, A Segment of Translation

Taylor conducted research into the work and writing of architect, theoretician, set designer, and sculptor Frederick Kiesler. The first retrospective in the Netherlands of this extraordinary artist, *Frederick Kiesler* 1890 - 1965, was held at Witte de With in 1996.



Camille Henrot, The Beaver Moon

Camille Henrot was drawn to the exhibition $Michelangelo\ Pistoletto\ e\ la\ fotografia$ (1993). In addition, she was influenced by $Bild\ Archive\ (2004)$, an exhibition of Ulrike Ottinger's video works in which a universe of strange characters unfolds, inspired by countercultures and questioning social norms and morals.



Germaine Kruip, A Room, 4 Minutes

A Room, 4 Minutes not only refers to Kruip's previous work A Room, 24 Hours, in which a lamp rotates 380 degrees over a time span of 24 hours, but also acts as a tribute to the work of artist David Lamelas, whose first retrospective exhibition in Europe, A New Refutation of Time, took place at Witte de With in 1997.

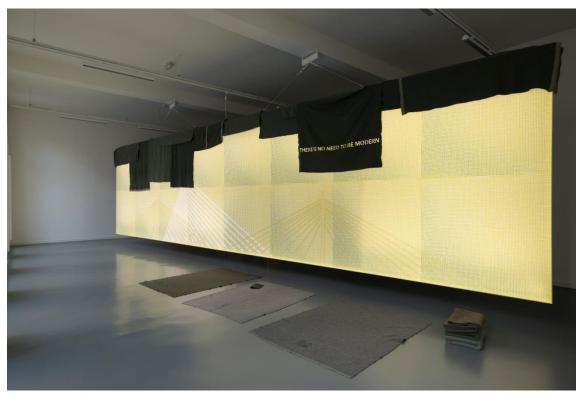




Raimundas Malašauskas, What Are We Looking at Tonight?

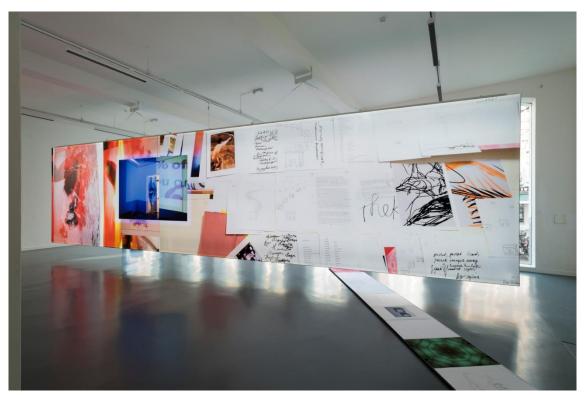

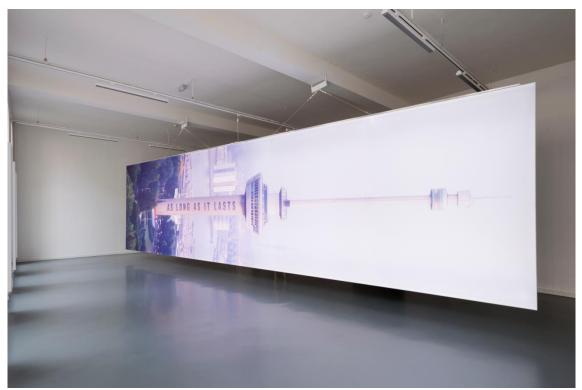

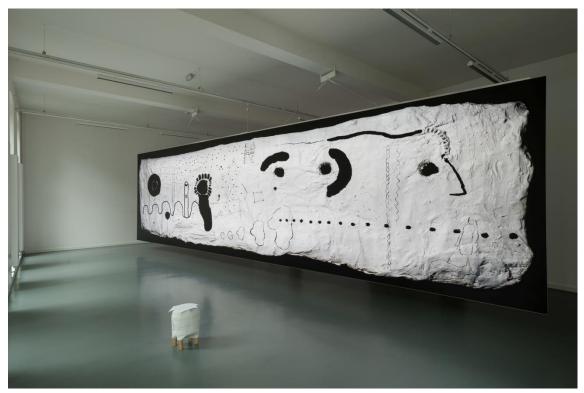
